Calm us into a quietness that heals and listens. May we grow each day into greater wholeness in mind, body and spirit. Amen




THE POPE'S PRAYER INTENTIONS FOR FEBRUARY: Universal: Violence against Women


PREPARING FOR MARRIAGE? Catholic Engaged Encounter

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK



Sunday 24th January marks the beginning of **Catholic Schools Week** 2021. During this week we aim to celebrate the unique contribution that Catholic schools, both primary and postprimary, make to supporting each other and living out Jesus' message of the gospel. This year's theme is 'Catholic Schools: **Communities of Faith** and Resilience'.

As we live through an unprecedented time of challenge and uncertainty, our faith and our resilience can be tested. We can ask questions like 'Will things ever be the same again?', 'When can we get back to normality?', 'Where is God in all of this?'

In response to this, we reflect upon how Catholic schools are communities of faith and resilience. In Catholic schools, we are called to support each other and to have faith in the promise of the Good News. Catholic schools are inspired by the belief that God has created each one of us with a capacity to give love and receive love. This love is bound in faith and is more resilient than any virus.
